Most Compelling Service Outcome

A collaborative mental health program is designed to develop social emotional health in children, families, and communities who are impacted by risk factors such as trauma, poverty, and lack of information regarding healthy parent-child relationships.

a) A total of 284 children 0-5 received mental health services; The parents of 96%(236/246) of the reported children indicated improvement in mental health symptoms after receiving services; the clinicians of 71%(150/212)of the children reported improvement.

b) The program also provided community based mental health services/screenings to 724 children 0-5; Of the parents reporting, 81%(144/177) reported improvement in the children's behavior.

c) 99% (78/79) of early education providers who were provided mental health consultation indicated improved skills and confidence in handling behavioral and emotional difficulties; 96% (76/79) reported a willingness to continue working with children with serious behavioral problems.

Benchmark/Baseline Data

a) In 2007-2008, the parents of 73% (81/111) of the reported children indicated improvement in mental health symptoms after receiving services.

c) In 2007-2008, 96% (73/76) of early education providers indicated improved skills and confidence; 93% (71/76) reported a willingness to continue working with children with serious behavioral problems.

a) The families of 98% (261/265) of the children enrolled in respite childcare made progress towards the improvement of their family environment; 98% (261/265) of the children enrolled in respite childcare were kept safe from child abuse without incident, thereby preserving the family

b) The level of risk for child abuse decreased for 96% (54/58) of the children 0-5 deemed "high-risk" after 6 months in a respite childcare program

c) 98% (78/80) of the children 0-5 remained out of foster care whose families were transitioning from a voluntary intensive program aimed at keeping children living in at-risk environments out of foster care; The parents of 90% (72/80) of the children 0-5 had no substantiated CPS referrals of abuse and neglect

- a) 1,273 early learning providers were trained to better care for and educate Stanislaus County's children 0-5, a 35% increase from 2007-2008 and 66% increase from 2006-2007
- b) 95% (283/298) of Family, Friends, & Neighbors providers indicated intent to practice new childcare skills learned in trainings
- c) 100% (447) Track III/IV CARES/AB 212 stipend recipients successfully completed at least 3 units of college coursework towards a higher Child Development Permit or college degree.
- d) 76% (253/331) of 2007-2008 Track III/IV stipend recipients returned to participate in 2008-2009; 21% (53) of returning CARES participants have progressed 3 or more permit levels

Provide a description of the evaluation activities completed during the fiscal year

The evaluation activities conducted during the 2008-2009 fiscal year were widely varied in order to capture both the breadth and the depth of impact Prop 10 funds have on the children, families, and communities of Stanislaus County. The activities ranged from analyzing organizational processes and tracking individual outcomes to assessing community needs and appraising the sustainability of services and results.

Evaluation is a process that occurs throughout the year and is integrated as much as possible into the planning and implementation of programs, and assimilated into daily operations. Programs are encouraged and supported in the process of planning, collecting, compiling, reporting, analyzing and sharing data. Viewed as a cycle, program evaluation activities incorporate information, reflection, learning, and action.

This cycle begins, ends, and begins again with the Strategic Plan that outlines the Commission's goals and objectives. The evaluation activities were designed to assess how the programs that are being funded with Prop 10 funds are contributing towards those stated goals and objectives. The information gathering component of the evaluation cycle starts as each program develops a Scope of Work (SOW) at the beginning of the fiscal year. The SOW becomes the foundation for each program's SCOARRS (Stanislaus County Outcomes and Results Reporting Sheet), and both informs and documents the services performed, resources used, and data collected. The SCOARRS provides a structured framework for tracking and reporting individual program data and outcomes based on the SOW. Towards the end of the 2007-2008 fiscal year, Commission staff and program staff worked together to create unique '08-'09 SCOARRS for each funded program. The SCOARRS are submitted quarterly by each program with the exception of School Readiness Programs, which are evaluated in an alternative way through a longitudinal study by CSU Stanislaus (described in SR-2). The 2008-2009 fiscal year was the first year utilizing the SCOARRS, and much was learned about what works and what areas can be improved.

The Commission and programs use both qualitative and quantitative methodologies to collect evaluation information. Programs utilize a variety of tools, including pre/post tests, surveys, observations, intakes, and screenings. Programs capture outcome and output data in the SCOARRS, and demographic data in PEDS. The Commission then incorporates this information with budgets, invoices, site visits, interviews, and annual reports to evaluate individual program effectiveness, as well as aggregate progress towards Commission goals and objectives.

The Commission also placed importance on evaluating community needs this fiscal year. A community priority survey was conducted, and the Commission partnered with other county and community organizations to fund a Community Health Assessment to assist with decision making.

An additional aspect of evaluation during the '08-'09 fiscal year was sustainability planning/assistance offered to all Commission programs. Social Entrepreneurs, Inc. staff met with 25 participating programs and assisted them in assessing what results/outcomes for children ages 0-5 and their families should be sustained over time. what services are essential to sustain in order

to support those results/outcomes, and what actions will be taken to sustain those services and results.

The Commission is also planning to study and evaluate collaboration efforts amongst funded programs. During the 2008-2009 fiscal year, a collaboration matrix tool will be utilized to assess the level of collaboration occurring between Commission partners. The emphasis will be on assessing perceptions of partnerships, the encouragement of additional collaboration efforts where appropriate, and providing opportunities for that to occur.

Efforts are also being made to streamline data collection and reporting.

Describe the evaluation findings reported during the fiscal year

Some of the most compelling program outcomes are captured in the AR-2 section, but the Family Resource Center (FRC) Initiative results will be briefly discussed, and then this section will focus on areas of broader evaluation findings.

The Commission, in conjunction with Community Services Agency (Child Protective Services), has funded countywide FRCs to provide Differential Response services for the last four years. Since the inception of this initiative, the rate of "no recurrence" of child maltreatment within a 6 month period in Stanislaus County has increased from 85.5% in 2004 (before DR services) to 91.5% in 2007. Although there are many factors that contribute to this rate of no recurrence, FRC data and outcomes indicate effective family engagement and progress in the areas of positive parenting skills and medical insurance for children. During the '08-'09 fiscal year, 5,180 caregivers of children 0-5 received support services through FRCs, 1,224 families were engaged in more intensive case management, 1,024 parents indicated increased positive parenting skills, and 152 children are now enrolled in health insurance. The Commission used this information to decide to issue a joint RFP to the community for an additional 3 years of funding for FRC services.

Process evaluation has revealed extremely useful information regarding the "how" and "how well" the Commission and its partners are providing effective services for Stanislaus County's young children. As mentioned previously, the '08-'09 fiscal year was the first year using the SCOARRS, and much was learned from the process and results. As staff worked with programs, a recurring theme was the presence of challenges faced by contractors to meet Commission data requirements and collect outcome information. This was also a finding by SEI during sustainability planning, followed by a recommendation that the Commission consider exploring implementation of a Management Information System that would also serve as an effective case management and reporting tool. Programs have greatly increased their understanding and capabilities in the realm of evaluation in the past two years, however additional tools and training are areas that will be explored for the more efficient use of human resources.

Another evaluation finding, also confirmed by the sustainability planning process, is the prevalence of effective collaboration efforts amongst Prop 10 funded programs, as well as with other community and county programs. It was determined that all programs partner to some degree with at least one



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other Commission funded program, and many programs work with several others to effectively provide unduplicated services to children and families. This has been a recurring finding for the last several years, and after the '07-'08 annual evaluation, Commission staff recommended that the Commission support collaboration efforts as well as utilize an evaluation framework to measure collaboration between programs. During '08-'09, work has occurred to plan for such a framework. Activities to promote and encourage collaboration, as well as measure the extent of such efforts, are designed for the '09-'10 fiscal year.

The evaluation of allocated resources has also revealed that Stanislaus County's Prop 10 funds are distributed broadly across the county. More than half of the program budget has consistently been dedicated to countywide programs for the past several fiscal years. In addition, the portion of the budget allocated to specific locations within the county quite closely aligns with population demographics. This balance of fund allocation results in countywide coverage of children and family services.

Describe the policy impact of the evaluation results



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Commission staff provides evaluation updates and information regularly to the funded programs, the Commission, the Board of Supervisors, the community, and other stakeholders. The impact of the evaluation activities and results can be found on both a program and systems level.

Funded programs receive evaluation feedback on a regular basis. From the SOW development, to quarterly SCOARRS reporting, to end-of-year program reporting reviews, programs provide and receive information, review and reflect on what is going well and what could use some improvement, and then take action to provide better services for our children and families. Numerous programs have indicated the value of measuring the impact of services provided, as well as evaluating the processes involved in providing the services. As a result, program policies and procedures have been revised to reflect evaluation recommendations. Programs also use evaluation information to apply for additional funding, as well as to present the effectiveness of their programs to the community and potential clients.

The Commission receives this Annual Report as well as an in-depth Annual Program Evaluation report, highlighting the findings for both process and summative evaluation. The Commission uses the evaluation process to inform decisions about budgeting, make recommendations about programs, and revise/update its strategic plan. The Commission did revise its strategic plan during the 2008-2009 fiscal year to reflect new community and program data from a variety of sources. These sources include the Commission's community priority survey, Community Health Assessment, Census data, Community Health Interview Survey, program outcomes, and best and promising practices research. The evaluation results greatly impacted how the Commission structured the revised strategic plan, and how the implementation of the plan is envisioned.

A key component of evaluation is sharing what the Commission and partners have been providing across the county, and the results of those activities. The October 2008 "Report to the Community" relayed to our vast variety of stakeholders the work that has been done with Prop 10 funding in Stanislaus County. Demographic and quantitative data, as well as stories and qualitative data are shared in a "user-friendly" way in the report, and is disseminated through the various local newspapers to 246,100 community members. Community stakeholders are more aware of the valuable work being done and can influence local as well as statewide policy with this knowledge.

The Commission also annually reports evaluation results to the Stanislaus County Board of Supervisors in the form of the "Report to the Community" and presentation of the report during a Board meeting. These forms of evaluation dissemination create awareness of the value of the Children & Families Commission and its partner programs, and helps to garner support for the results of the services provided.

Evaluation Purpose

To identify improvements in the following areas and relate these improvements to SR-funded services:

- 1) Family functioning, as indicated by adopting desired family practices (such as reading to children daily) and participating in family support programs (adult education, family counseling, etc.)
- 2) Child development, as indicated by access to early childhood education opportunities that include literacy fairs and parent-child classes
- 3) Child health, as indicated by physical measures (weight and height) and access to medical, behavioral, and other health screenings
- 4) Systems of care, as indicated by participation in such activities as summer transition programs and Kindergarten enrichment programs
- 5) Readiness to learn, as indicated by scores on a standardized readiness measure
- 6) Development of social skills, as indicated by the frequency of exhibiting positive and negative social behaviors
- 7) Literacy development, as indicated by scores on standardized tests of literacy skills

Evaluation Method

Families are recruited at the start of Kindergarten and asked about practices (e.g., reading at home; visiting the classroom) that are relevant to SR outcomes. SR coordinators work with families to identify the SR-funded services received by each family and child. Kindergarten teachers assess readiness to learn by completing 24 items from the ADRDP for each student with parental consent. The teachers also complete a subset of 6 items from the Early Childhood Longitudinal Study to assess social skills of each participating child. University students then administer the DIBELS tests of literacy development in English (and, in some cases, Spanish).

The social skill measures and literacy development measures are administered again in grades 1, 3, and 4, with extensions planned through grade 6. A longitudinal design is used, together with a comparison group of children who were assessed 1 or 2 years immediately before the first cohort of SR children entered each grade.



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Measurement Technique

Access to SR services is determined by calculating the percentage of families who received each service. Trends in these percentages are examined across time for each school district to determine if SR services are improving as programs mature. Outcomes associated with individual SR services are assessed by comparing children who received each service with children who did not receive that service. This comparison draws heavily from the baseline group of children who were tracked before SR children entered each grade. The longitudinal nature of the design allows developmental trends to be mapped, so that long-term impacts of SR services can be identified. These trends are compared to those of baseline children, to distinguish normal developmental trends (as observed in the baseline cohorts) from developmental trends seen in SR children. Additional comparisons of outcomes are made between school districts that offer similar SR services to identify best practices.

Sample Selection

An average of 3 Kindergarten classes is sampled each year in each of 10 participating schools representing 7 school districts throughout Stanislaus County. Parents or guardians of students in these classes are asked if they would like to participate in the SR evaluation; consent rates typically exceed 85%. Children are tracked from Kindergarten through later grades, with periodic renewal of parent or guardian consent. Confidentiality is ensured by using ID numbers only to track each child; the SR evaluation team does not have access to individual student names. The total sample now exceeds 3,600 students.

Data Processing

A large variety of data analytic tools is used. These range from frequency counts and t-tests, through analyses of variance, to more sophisticated tools such as multiple regression and factor analysis. Comparisons between SR and baseline children are sometimes made using matched samples to control for confounding variables (such as native language and preschool attendance); however, as sample sizes have increased, most of these comparisons are now made using multiple regression to control for confounds. Multiple regression is also used – in conjunction with other tools suited to trend analysis – for longitudinal data analyses.

Presentations for lay audiences typically make extensive use of graphical presentations. These include 3D histograms to illustrate access to services as a function of the service type and the school district, and spider or star charts to illustrate the differences between SR and baseline children on multiple outcomes simultaneously.



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Conclusions

SR evaluations are used to identify needs (as when access to services is lower than expected), facilitate program development (as when a given program has better outcomes in one district than in another), and to guide funding decisions made by the Stanislaus Commission (as when outcomes for one SR service are consistently better than those of another SR service that targets the same outcome). Annual presentations of evaluation findings to districts, the Commission, and other stakeholders identify best practices and promising programs. Furthermore, the longitudinal nature of our design, and the baseline cohorts that constitute a true comparison group, have enabled us to identify the long-term benefits of SR funding. This is especially evident in literacy development, where SR funding appears to have a tremendous impact on literacy development, and may help English learners overcome the literacy gap with their native English peers.
