Most Compelling Service Outcome

A collaborative mental health program was innovatively designed to serve children 0-5. The program's focus is to develop social-emotional health in children whose families have been impacted by trauma, poverty, and other risk factors. The results of these services are children with social-emotional health, and families who understand them.

a) 287 children 0-5 received mental health services; the parents of 82% (205/250) of the reported children indicated improvement in mental health symptoms after receiving services; the clinicians of 72% (150/205) of the children reported improvement.

b) Community based mental health services/screenings were provided to 783 children 0-5; Of the parents reporting, 85% (96/113) reported improvement in the children's behavior; 98% (57/58) of early educators who were provided mental health consultation indicated improved skills and confidence in handling behavioral/emotional difficulties; 95% (55/58) will continue to work with difficult children.

Benchmark/Baseline Data

a) 2007-2008: the parents of 73% (81/111) of the reported children indicated improvement in mental health symptoms after receiving services

2008-2009: the parents of 96% (236/246) indicated improvement. The clinicians of 71% (150/212) of the children reported improvement.

b) 2007-2008: 96% (73/76) of the early education providers indicated improved skills and confidence; 93% (71/76) reported a willingness to continue working with children with serious behavioral problems

2008-2009: Community based mental health services/screenings were provided to 724 children 0-5; of the parents reporting, 81% (144/177) reported improvement in the children's behavior; 99% (78/79) of early the early education providers indicated improved skills and confidence; 96% (76/79) reported a willingness to continue working with children.

- a) The families of 99% (389/390) of the children enrolled in respite childcare made progress towards the improvement of their family environment; 99% (385/390) of the children enrolled were kept safe from child abuse without incident, thereby preserving the family
- b) The level of risk for child abuse decreased for 94% (258/275) of the children 0-5 deemed "high-risk" after 6 months in a respite childcare program
- c) 100% (32/32) of the children 0-5 remained out of foster care whose families were transitioning from a voluntary intensive program aimed at keeping children living in at-risk environments out of foster care; the parents of 97% (31/32) of the children 0-5 had no substantiated CPS referrals of abuse and neglect

Benchmark/Baseline Data

- a) 2007-2008: 98% (297/303) children enrolled in respite childcare were kept safe
2008-2009: 98% (261/265) children enrolled in respite childcare were kept safe; the families of 98% (261/265) of the children made progress towards the improvement of their family environment

Provide a description of the evaluation activities completed during the fiscal year

During 2009-2010, the Stanislaus County Children and Families Commission continued to develop and refine evaluation activities. Evaluation encompasses multiple activities, and the primary purpose is to promote an environment of learning – learning about what is working and what isn't; learning about how a program is impacting individuals, families, and communities; and learning about how Prop 10 funded programs, individually and collectively, are contributing to the desired population outcomes expressed in the SCCFC strategic plan.

Evaluation activities have been developed into a cycle throughout any given fiscal year. The cycle begins with the SCCFC Strategic Plan that communicates the Commission's goals, objectives, and strategies. Each funded program addresses the Strategic Plan through its activities and planned outcomes, which are articulated in a Scope of Work (SOW) that is developed in the beginning of the fiscal year. The SOW becomes the foundation for each program's SCOARRS (Stanislaus County Outcomes and Results Reporting Sheet), and both inform and document the services performed, resources used, and data collected. Both documents are constructed jointly between Commission staff and program staff, and each draws on the unique capacity of the programs to contribute to the Commission's goals and objectives.

The SCOARRS provides a structured framework for tracking and reporting individual program data and outcomes based on the SOW, and are submitted quarterly by all programs with the exception of School Readiness (SR) Programs (evaluated in an alternative way through a longitudinal study by CSU Stanislaus evaluators described in SR-2). SCOARRS data contribute to effective monitoring of each program on a quarterly basis, and also supply programs with information to learn what is working well and what improvements can be made throughout the fiscal year.

Utilizing both qualitative and quantitative methods of collecting, analyzing, and reporting data, the Commission and programs continuously evaluate programs throughout the yearly cycle. A variety of tools provide the programs and Commission with program data, including the following: pre/post tests, customer satisfaction surveys, employee satisfaction surveys, observations, intakes, and screenings. Programs capture outcome and output data in SCOARRS, and demographic data in PEDS, and report quarterly. Commission staff then incorporates this information, along with information from budgets, invoices, site visits, interviews, and narrative annual reports to evaluate individual program effectiveness, as well as overall progress towards Commission goals and objectives.

Commission staff also continues to study and evaluate collaboration efforts amongst funded programs. At the beginning of the '09-'10 fiscal year, a collaboration matrix tool was utilized to assess the level of collaboration occurring between Commission partners. That information was shared with programs, and a forum was provided in which they could discuss the results. Many programs found that there were differences in perception of partnerships, and encouragement to dialogue about those differences, and to discover ways to increase collaboration where appropriate has been supported.

Describe the evaluation findings reported during the fiscal year

The 2009-2010 compelling program outcomes from the evaluation findings are captured in the AR-2 section. This section will instead focus on the Family Resource Center initiative's evaluation findings, and then on areas of broader evaluation findings.

The Commission, in conjunction with Community Services Agency (Child Protective Services) have funded countywide Family Resource Centers (FRCs) to provide Differential Response services for the last five years. The evaluation process has yielded a multitude of process evaluation data, and many of the program and initiative changes have been based on that data. Staff from all FRCs meet twice a month to discuss cases, but at the same time they also discuss service successes and challenges (what is working and what is not). Tools, methods, and practices have been refined and changed during this learning process. As a result, during the '09-'10 fiscal year, 2,963 caregivers of children 0-5 received support services through FRCs, 1,452 families were engaged in more intensive case management, 1,403 parents indicated increased positive parenting skills (98% of those finishing parent education), and 115 children are now enrolled in health insurance (93% of those in need).

Process evaluation again revealed useful information regarding the "how" and "how well" the Commission and its partners are providing effective services for the 0-5 population being served. However, findings have consistently suggested that programs have challenges regarding data collection and outcome development. Commission staff and program staff have consistently worked together to build evaluation capacity and develop strategies to overcome these challenges through various means. In addition, two groups related to evaluation have been developed to work on these challenges: the Evaluation Advisory Group and the Database Work Group. The Evaluation Advisory Group consists of contractor partners, Commission staff, and a Commissioner. This group has been exploring broad evaluation issues that concern all levels of evaluation, including program, Commission, and State issues. The Database Work Group has been discussing the need for a database system to consolidate and simplify the process of collecting, compiling, and reporting output and outcome data within the RBA framework on client, program, and Commission levels. This group developed and processed a Request for Information, as well as a Request for Proposals based on the work being done.

Evaluation findings were also noted in the area of contractor/partner collaborations. All programs, in various degrees, have put forth efforts in establishing partnerships or collaborative endeavors. It was determined that it is more appropriate for some programs to collaborate with others, but there are also different perceptions amongst programs as to the extent to which programs are working together. It is also the case that between two given programs, one may be more likely to view a collaboration as more beneficial and/or necessary than the other. The Commission has encouraged programs to start and/or continue dialogue about perceptions, expectations, and possibilities of collaboration efforts by providing time and activities to do so.

Describe the policy impact of the evaluation results

Evaluation results were used during the 2009-2010 fiscal year to inform policy decisions on multiple levels. Both process and summative evaluation information served to effect changes for programs and initiatives, as well as to inform the Commission in making policy and funding decisions.

Funded programs receive evaluation feedback throughout the fiscal year, as part of the evaluation feedback loop. Programs both provide and receive information throughout the year. By using reflective reporting tools, such as the SCOARRS and Annual Reports, programs review what is going well and what could use improvement. Then, through the process of self-examination along with Commission staff recommendations, programs take action to improve methods and/or services. Consistently, programs have indicated the value of this process and have used the evaluation results to revise program policies and procedures.

The Commission receives evaluation information periodically in the form of this Annual Report, an in-depth Annual Program Evaluation, a separate School Readiness Annual Report, and the State Annual Report. The Commission utilizes this information to assist in the decisions regarding short and long-term budgeting, making recommendations about programs, and revising and updating its strategic plan. Evaluation information has influenced decisions about prioritizing strategies and services, and where to focus diminishing resources. For example, evaluation results suggested the importance of FRC services, and the Commission funded FRCs for an additional three years.

Perhaps the most influential evaluation information used for policy decisions was derived from the School Readiness (SR) evaluation. As the State discontinued the match funding for local SR programs, the Commission was faced with the decision of whether to continue funding the programs that had been operating for eight years. Data suggested that four core areas of SR services were the most effective in preparing children for school at the SR sites. The Commission decided to fund "Core 4 Early Foundations" programs that concentrated on those areas at a substantially less cost.

Evaluation results can also impact policy through the thorough dissemination of evaluation results. The Commission distributes this information through the "Report to the Community," which relays the results of the work being done with Prop 10 funding in Stanislaus County in a "user friendly" manner. In 2009, the report reached a wide variety of stakeholders through local newspapers, providing over 246,000 stakeholders with narratives, demographics, and outcomes of services. Community stakeholders in turn share this information, influencing local policy (e.g., school and city policy). The Stanislaus County Board of Supervisors also receive a presentation based on the "Report to the Community," creating additional knowledge and support at the County policy level.

Evaluation Purpose

To identify improvements in these areas and relate improvements to SR-funded services:

- Family functioning, as indicated by adopting desired family practices (such as reading to children daily) and participating in family support programs (adult education, family counseling, etc.)
- Child development, as indicated by access to early childhood education opportunities including literacy fairs and parent-child classes
- Child health, as indicated by physical measures (weight and height) and access to medical, behavioral, and other health screenings
- Systems of care, as indicated by participation in such activities as summer transition and Kindergarten enrichment programs
- Readiness to learn at Kindergarten entry, as indicated by scores on a standardized readiness measure
- Development of social skills, as indicated by the frequency of exhibiting positive and negative social behaviors at school
- Literacy development, as indicated by scores on standardized tests of literacy skills

Evaluation Method

Families are recruited at the start of Kindergarten and asked about practices (e.g., reading at home; visiting the classroom) that are relevant to SR outcomes. SR coordinators work with families to identify the SR-funded services received by each family and child. Kindergarten teachers assess readiness to learn by completing 24 items from the DRDP for each student with parental consent. The teachers also complete a subset of 6 items from the Early Childhood Longitudinal Study to assess social skills of each participating child. University students then administer the DIBELS tests of literacy development in English (and, in some cases, Spanish).

The social skill measures and literacy development measures are administered again in grades 1, 3, 4, and 6. A longitudinal design is used, together with a comparison group of children who were assessed 1 or 2 years immediately before the first cohort of SR children entered each grade.

Measurement Technique

Access to SR services is determined by calculating the percentage of families who received each service. Trends in these percentages are examined across time for each school district to determine if SR services are improving as programs mature. Outcomes associated with individual SR services are assessed by comparing children who received each service with children who did not receive that service. This comparison draws heavily from the baseline group of children who were tracked before SR children entered each grade. The longitudinal nature of the design allows developmental trends to be mapped, so that long-term impacts of SR services can be identified. These trends are compared to those of baseline children, to distinguish normal developmental trends (as observed in the baseline cohorts) from developmental trends seen in SR children. Additional comparisons of outcomes are made between school districts that offer similar SR services to identify best practices.

Sample Selection

An average of 3 Kindergarten classes is sampled each year in each of 10 participating schools representing 7 school districts throughout Stanislaus County. Parents or guardians of students in these classes are asked if they would like to participate in the SR evaluation; consent rates typically exceed 85%. Children are tracked from Kindergarten through later grades, with periodic renewal of parent or guardian consent. Confidentiality is ensured by using ID numbers only to track each child; the SR evaluation team does not have access to individual student names. The total sample now exceeds 4,100 students.

Data Processing

A large variety of data analytic tools is used. These range from frequency counts and t-tests, through analyses of variance, to more sophisticated tools such as multiple regression, factor analysis, and cluster analysis. Comparisons between SR and baseline children are sometimes made using matched samples to control for confounding variables (such as native language and preschool attendance); however, as sample sizes have increased, most of these comparisons are now made using multiple regression to control for confounds. Multiple regression is also used – in conjunction with other tools suited to trend analysis – for longitudinal data analyses.

Presentations for lay audiences typically make extensive use of graphical presentations. These include 3D histograms to illustrate access to services as a function of the service type and the school district, and spider or star charts to illustrate the differences between SR and baseline children on multiple outcomes simultaneously.

Four services appear to be particularly beneficial for SR children: services that facilitate the development of pre-literacy skills; services that assist parents and guardians in improving their parenting skills through individualized feedback and practice; services that identify children with behavioral issues and connect children and their families to appropriate resources; and month-long services that assist children and their families in making the transition to Kindergarten. Compared to their peers, children who have received these four core services exhibit improved readiness to learn when they enter Kindergarten, more frequent display of positive behaviors and improved control of negative behaviors in the classroom, and accelerated literacy development. Many of these benefits remain evident through Grade 3 and beyond. The four core services also appear to help English language learners overcome the literacy challenges they face relative to native English speakers.
